#### 2023 The Year of the Lion in New Hampshire

Mentors. Have you had one in your professional life? Your Lions life? Did they help guide you toward success? Were they there for advice and motivation? Who needs a mentor?

One of the signs of a good leader is to make more leaders. The best way to do this is to mentor others as they strive to become the next leaders. Mentoring is a way to do this. If you have been a Lions leader and someone comes up and asks questions, wants advice, or wants direction, it is your job to help them and let them know you are here to help them on their journey into leadership. This can be at the club, zone, district or multiple district level.

At the club level, encourage newer Lions to shadow officers of your club. Direct them to the club officer training on April 22 (see flyer in this issue). Let them know they don't have to be an officer to attend. It is open to all Lions. This is the first step to becoming their mentor.

Maybe a Lion has talked to you about taking on a zone or district position. Talk to them about it. The pros and cons. You can encourage them to put in their application for our next Regional Lions Leadership Institute that will be held here in New Hampshire on March 3-5 (see flyer in this issue). This will give them many of the skills they may need as they go forward.

There is also a formal Mentoring program in LCI. They offer a basic and advanced program that you and the mentee can follow.

And if you don't feel qualified to offer the level of support and knowledge that someone needs, reach out to any of the past district or multiple district leadership to take this on. This is why we are here.

And finally, if you are someone who wants a mentor, don't be afraid to reach out to a leader that you admire or look up to. Ask them if they will be your mentor. It does not have to be a formal mentorship. Just a supportive one. Remember: True leaders don't create followers. They create more leaders! Be a Leader.


