Dear Lions.

As of April 30,2023, there is approximately \$2,200.00 available in this fund. In a conversation with the incoming District Governor Toni Olden, she has expressed that she will continue with this program until the fund is completely expended.

I would like to remind all clubs that Lions Youth Services has a grant program that will refund expenses up to \$500.00 per event, two events per Lion's year up to a maximum \$1,000.00 per Lion's Year for youth activities.

The Multi-District is looking for \$100.00 from each club to offset the expenses of a float and marching band for the International Convention in Boston. Thank you to all the clubs who have donated to this cause already.

Future in Sight (formally The New Hampshire Association of the Blind) has started a program called "LIFT" and is seeking volunteers across the State of New Hampshire to drive Future in Sight clients to their appointments. If needed, a Registration form is in this issue of the Roar. Please call PDG Christine as soon as possible if you have not already registered for the convention.



A food desert is a term used for decades by researchers to describe areas of the country, often poor and remote, where healthy food choices are hard to find. Often in these areas, there is just one small grocery store, limited transportation options for residents, and usually a high concentration of people with diabetes. The lack of access to healthy food reflects a larger problem in America - food insecurity. Food insecurity is a lack of consistent access to enough food for an active, healthy life and it's an issue that touches people of all ages with all types of diabetes.

What is the diabetes link?

Whether it's the result of too many empty calories or not enough nutritious ones, research shows that food insecurity in all its forms is a major risk factor for type 2 diabetes. For most Americans experiencing food insecurity, the problem isn't that they're getting too few calories, it's that they're getting too many of the wrong kind. Usually, the cheapest and most readily available foods (fatty, fried take-out, high sodium prepared meals, candy, and soft drinks) provide plenty of calories, but they contribute to making it hard to properly manage chronic conditions such as high blood pressure, kidney disease and diabetes. That's why researchers and food policy experts have begun moving away from the term "food desert". Neighborhoods that lack supermarkets may still have plenty of places where residents can buy food – it's just not very healthy food.

Diabetes may be tied to food insecurity in other ways, too. For some people, diabetes may be the cause of their food insecurity, not just the result. For example, someone with complications from diabetes may have a harder time holding a job. And people on limited budgets might have to make the choice between meals and medication to control their diabetes.

For adults and children who already have type 1 or type 2 diabetes, food insecurity can also increase the risks of complications. If you start skipping meals, for example, it can disrupt your blood sugar levels and put you at risk for hypoglycemia or low blood sugar. On the other side, those with diabetes who can afford only unhealthy food may have more frequent high blood sugar levels, which can raise the risk of long-term complications. Eliminating food insecurity would go a long way toward reducing the burden of

diabetes. But researchers are quick to point out that food insecurity, like poverty, won't be an easy problem to fix.

In the meantime, most low-income people with diabetes must rely heavily on food pantries for weekly assistance. Fortunately, food donors are now being educated on what constitutes a healthy donation to a food bank or pantry and there is a big emphasis on protein, dairy, low sodium, low sugar, and fresh fruits and vegetables.

Pediatric Cancer

Looking at the various service activities done by Lions around the world, I wanted to share a few for you to think about adopting/adapting for your club.

District 22A made Joy Boxes for children ages 6-11 that were battling cancers. The supplied a list of items that the district then put together for the children. Clubs have visited children in the hospital and brought gifts, donations to them. They have collected tabs for Ronald McDonald House. They have held Pancake Breakfasts, Steak and Sausage Feed, Pasta Dinners, Shave for the Kids events, Make-A-Wish Events, Relay for Live events, other running and walking events. Some built isolation rooms in a Cancer Ward. Some donated to the Magic Yarn Foundation for hats and wigs. Pill bottle collections, golf outings, blood and platelet donations, Cancer Camps. You can think about getting a collection of gift cards for food, gas, etc. and perhaps donate them to David's House where families of children who are receiving treatment at DHMC stay. You may like to donate a red wagon equipped with IV poles for kids to be moved around the wards in the hospital while enjoying some time out of their rooms.

If your club is looking for ideas, visit the Pediatric Cancer pages at LCI for suggestions of activities, grant applications and other ideas. Remember the vast majority of childhood cancers do not have a known cause. Cancer prevention efforts in children should focus on behaviors that will prevent the child from developing preventable cancer as an adult. Prompt, corrective diagnosis followed by effective, evidence-based therapy with tailored supportive care is the most effective strategy to reduce the burden of cancer in children and improve the outcomes. (World Health Organization)



BEDFORD LIONS

With great sadness, the Bedford Lions club reports the loss of one of its long-time members. Lion Andrew "Andy" Letourneau passed away on April 5, 2023. Andy was a member of the Bedford Lions club for 50 years until his passing. He served as King Lion in 1980-1981 and again in 1997-1998, and was named Lion of the Year in 1974-1975 and again in 1991-1992. He was honored as President of the Year 1997-1998, and received the Melvin Jones Award in 1999. Andy was always an active participant in club projects, preferring to work behind the scenes. He was very involved in the Lightbulb project (remember that?), our Adopt-a Highway program, and soliciting advertisements for the annual Bedford Community Telephone Book. For many years he flipped pancakes and cooked sausages for our annual Pancake Breakfast. Andy loved being in the Lions Club and was a role model for new Lions.
