How does it work?

At the end of June 2024, we will take the total number of service hours reported to Lions International for each club. That number will be divided by the number of members in the club at year end to determine the average number of service hours per member for the year.

Example:

Club A has reported 1500 hours of service at the end of June.

They have 20 members on their roster.

1500/20=75 hours per year per member.

Several project ideas from Lions Clubs International were listed in the July ROAR. Below are more project ideas from Lions Clubs International.

- Volunteer to harvest unpicked vegetables and fruits at farms and orchards to donate to food pantries, homeless shelters, or senior centers.
- Host a grocery store tour where a nutritionist gives participants tips on choosing healthy groceries.
- Collaborate with a food bank to organize a community food drive, focusing on collecting items most needed in your area.
- Create a cookbook of inexpensive, healthy, easy-to-make recipes.
- Work with your local schools to provide weekend take-home bags of nutritious snacks for children in need.
- Sponsor cooking classes for youth and adults to learn basic cooking skills for healthy living.
- Create an online resource on planning and portioning meals to reduce household food waste.

If you haven't done it already, consider inviting a community health professional to visit your club and educate members on the prevalence and impact of hunger in your community.

Call To Action for our Environment: Service projects



Addressing the shocking Impact of Animal Agriculture:

As advocates for positive change in our communities, it's essential for us to be aware of the environmental issues affecting our planet. Please read on to understand the often-overlooked impact of animal agriculture and to learn ways we can contribute to sustainable solutions.

Understanding the Impact: Animal agriculture and eating diets heavy in animal products, including meats and dairy, are significant drivers of environmental degradation and global warming. Overall, the U.N. agency estimates that, globally, the raising of livestock of all kinds is responsible for nearly 15 percent of all emissions related to human activity. According to a study referenced in a recent NYT article*,"[one person eating] more than 3.5 ounces of meat daily accounted for 22.5 pounds of carbon dioxide emissions a day...Vegan diets had the lowest totals, accounting for 5.4 pounds of carbon dioxide a day...There were parallel effects on freshwater pollution and biodiversity loss by diet type." The same study found that If everyone in the UK reduce their consumption of animal products by 50% it would be equivalent to taking 8 millions cars off the road!

Addressing Animal Agriculture's Impact: As responsible citizens and stewards of our environment, we have the power to make a positive difference. By raising awareness and adopting sustainable practices, we can collectively work towards reducing the impact of animal agriculture.

Promote Plant-Based Diets: Encourage the adoption of plant-based choices among your community members and at your events. Educate and Raise Awareness: Organize workshops, seminars, and awareness campaigns to inform others about the environmental impact of animal agriculture. Knowledge empowers people to make informed choices.

Reduce Food Waste: Advocate for reducing food waste at both the individual and institutional levels. Wasting less food also means reducing the demand for excessive animal agriculture while keeping garbage out of landfills.

- 1) All requests submitted by the President of a Lions Club in the State of New Hampshire Districts 44N and/or 44H.
- The Maximum Grant is \$500. LYS will consider up to 2 requests per NH Lions Club per Lions year (July June) for different projects.
- Each application must be for a unique project. Applications for the same project within the same Lions Year will not be considered.
- Each application should benenfit more than one individual. Applications benefitting one person will not be considered.
- 4) Grant Applications <u>MUST</u> be mailed to: LYS, PO Box 156, Atkinson, NH 03811 by the last day of the month *prior* to the start of the project. No reimbursements will be approved.

It is the intent of Lions Youth Services Grant Program to partner with the Lions Clubs of New Hampshire to serve the youth of our state, not to replace your club's support.





Henniker Lions Club






