






Grant Request Guidelines:

All Grant Applications meeting the following guidelines will be reviewed at the next Lions Youth Services Meeting. Our meetings are held at 6:30 pm on the 2nd Thursday of every month at the Airport Diner in Manchester. If possible, we encourage all clubs to join us to present their request.

- 1) All requests submitted by the President of a Lions Club in the State of New Hampshire Districts 44N and/or 44H
- 2) The Maximum Grant is \$500. LYS will consider up to 2 requests per NH Lions Chib per Lions year (July-June)
- Each application must be for a unique project. Applications for the same project within the same Lions Year will not be considered.
- Each application should benefit more than one individual. Applications benefitting one person will not be considered.
- Grant Applications <u>MUST</u> be received by the last day of the month *prior* to the start of the project, otherwise the request may not be considered.

It is the intent of Lions Youth Services Grant Program to partner with the Lions Clubs of New Hampshire to serve the Youth of our state; not to replace your club's support.

MD 44 REGIONAL LIONS LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE



There were 19 participants: 2 from VT, 5 from 44H, 12 from 44N. It was a great experience, and so wonderful to meet so many great Lions from 44N.



Grants support the Lions Quest program, a comprehensive social and emotional learning (SEL) initiative that equips young people with the skills they need to succeed in school and life. Through this grant program, Lions clubs can bring Lions Quest to schools and communities, helping children develop critical life skills such as emotional regulation, responsible decision-making, and positive relationship building. Lions Quest focuses on promoting healthy behaviors, fostering a sense of citizenship, and preventing issues like bullying, drug use, and violence. The program combines classroom-based lessons with community service, encouraging students to practice what they've learned in real-life settings. With over 19 million students reached in more than 100 countries, Lions Quest has become a proven tool for creating safer, healthier learning environments.

The Lions Quest Program Grant provides funding for teacher training, curriculum materials, and program implementation, ensuring that schools have the resources they need to deliver high-quality SEL instruction. By supporting this program, LCIF and Lions are helping to shape the next generation of leaders—youth who are confident, compassionate, and ready to make a positive impact in their communities. Districts may apply for \$10,000 up to \$50,000 with 25% matching funds.

The Lions Quest Promotional Grant is designed to assist districts in improving understanding and communication of the Lions Quest program. Under this grant, districts may apply for up to \$1,500 from LCIF for promotional activities related to the program, including but not limited to informational seminars for Lions, community committees, and/or educators/ school administrators.

The objective of such seminars is to provide information and strategies to Lions and non-Lions on how to start a Lions Quest program in their community. An ideal seminar would include activities from Lions Quest trainers, knowledgeable local Lions, teachers or LCIF staff, which highlight the curriculum and teacher training; strategies for approaching school districts; and how to secure partners and funding. The Community Partnership Grant program was

created to give Lions districts and multiple districts The Lions Clubs International Foundation Lions Quest access to small amounts of funding that can be used in a variety of ways in support of the Lions Quest program. The objective is for the Community Partnership Grant program to be used to either start Lions Quest programs in new areas or reactivate dormant programs. Because the funds are awarded on a rolling basis, Community Partnership Grants should be used to capitalize on interest in Lions Quest Programming when and where it exists. Grant funds may be used to: host one or more teacher training workshops; conduct Lions Quest promotional activities, including informational sessions for Lions, educators, government officials and other potential partners; translate or adapt Lions Quest curriculum materials; establish partnerships with school districts, community organizations, and government agencies; and evaluation of Lions Quest results, both qualitative and quantitative.

> Through the Lions Quest Grant, Lions are investing in a brighter future, empowering young people with the tools they need to navigate life's challenges and contribute to a more caring and connected world.

HUNGER

Dear Lions, Lioness Lions, and Leos,

Hunger is a fundamental human experience, yet its Emotional and Spiritual Effects of Hunger impacts on the body, mind, and spirit can be profound On a deeper level, hunger challenges the human spirit, and complex. While often considered a physical condition, hunger's effects extend far beyond mere hopelessness. Emotional well-being is heavily physiological responses, influencing mental health and impacted, as persistent hunger erodes self-esteem and emotional well-being while also challenging the essence of human resilience and spirit.

Physical Effects of Hunger

Hunger first manifests in the body, as it struggles to adjust to a lack of essential nutrients. Blood sugar levels drop, causing fatigue, irritability, and impaired cognitive function. Over time, the body begins breaking down muscle tissue for energy, leading to physical weakness and decreased strength. Persistent hunger may result in long-term damage to vital to chronic illnesses. Malnutrition caused by hunger can alter metabolism, often leading to complications in weight regulation, bone density, and overall physical health.

Mental Effects of Hunger

The brain, reliant on nutrients to perform optimally, suffers significantly during periods of hunger. Low glucose levels impair concentration, memory, and decision-making capabilities. Over time, hunger can disrupt hormone balance, affecting mood regulation and stress response. Psychological symptoms like anxiety, depression, and chronic irritability often emerge as the mind grapples with the uncertainty and discomfort of persistent hunger. In severe cases, cognitive development may be stunted, particularly in children who experience prolonged periods without adequate nourishment.

often giving rise to feelings of shame, isolation, and motivation. For those experiencing hunger due to food insecurity, the mental toll can be compounded by societal stigma or systemic barriers. Spiritually, hunger can test an individual's resilience, sometimes fostering a sense of despair, but it may also drive compassion, community connection, and advocacy for change. While hunger often alienates, it can also unite people around the shared goal of alleviating suffering.

Hunger is a stark reminder of the interconnectedness between physical health, mental stability, and organs, reduce immunity, and increase susceptibility emotional strength. Addressing hunger on a global scale is not only vital for survival but also for nurturing the holistic well-being of humanity. Beyond the biological consequences, hunger deeply influences the way individuals engage with themselves, their communities, and the world, underscoring the need for sustainable solutions and collective action.

NH Lions Green Team: Celebrate Earth Day with Service!

Earth Day has been celebrated every April 22 since 1970, marking a turning point in the modern environmental movement. What began as a national teach-in on environmental issues has grown into a global day of action, inspiring individuals and organizations to take steps toward a cleaner, healthier planet.

As Lions, we know that service makes a difference and that small changes, when multiplied by many people, can lead to huge impacts. Simple actions like switching to reusable bags, reducing food waste, or repairing rather than replacing can seem minor, but collectively, they add up to meaningful progress. Imagine if every Lion in New Hampshire committed to reducing single-use plastics or planting pollinator-friendly flowers—our communities would see and feel the difference!



We had representatives from Rise for Baby and Families as our guest speakers this month. Rise for Baby and Families has been open since 1981. They are a provider of Early Intervention Services for the Monadnock Region. These services are for infants with developmental delays or disabilities or are at risk for developmental delays and their families. This past year they serviced 496 families. They provide transdisciplinary services depending on the families and context of the child's needs. There is no cost to the families. Rise gets paid by Medicaid and private insurances so they do a lot of fundraising to help cover costs. They provide an onsite child care program which currently had 26 children attending. This is open to the community so typically developing children as well as children with development disabilities are welcome. They work with the Pyramid Model for social and emotional needs as well as with Alliance for Families for family support. Families can request an evaluation if they have questions about delays. They do not have to have a doctor's referral to evaluate but they do receive them. They don't want the family to have to "wait and see" if they feel there is a question. Currently there are about a dozen children and families from the Chesterfield area being serviced by Rise.

We will be doing our Spring Roadside Clean Up in the next month as well as continuing to work on the golf tournament planning. Members also attended Monadnock Lions Club Roast Beef Dinner and their Bingo afternoon. Both activities were a lot of fun and we were happy to support a neighboring club.

We found out our final totals from our Super Bowl Sunday Pancake Breakfast was \$3,124.57 profit this year despite the weather and fewer donations.


