



The Lions Clubs International Foundation Emergency Grant program provides immediate financial assistance to communities affected by natural or man-made disasters. When a disaster strikes, these grants enable Lions to respond quickly, delivering essential aid like food, water, shelter, and medical supplies to those in need.

LCIF Emergency Grants are available to Lions clubs worldwide, allowing them to offer swift relief during critical moments. Whether it's after a hurricane. earthquake, wildfire, or other emergencies, these grants help Lions on the ground organize relief efforts and provide life-saving resources to affected communities.

With a rapid response framework, LCIF ensures that aid reaches vulnerable populations within days of a disaster. Lions, often among the first to respond, work closely with local authorities and relief organizations to assess needs and distribute aid where it's most urgently required.

By funding these quick responses, LCIF's Emergency Grants bring hope and relief to disasterstricken areas, reinforcing the Lions' commitment to serving communities during their most challenging times. These grants make a real difference in saving lives and supporting recovery efforts in the immediate aftermath of a crisis.

The maximum grant available is \$15,000 and at least 100 people must be displaced or impacted by the disaster. The District Governor must endorse the application and it should be submitted withing 30 days of the disaster's occurrence.



Hello Lions of MD44,

Lions who wish to pursue leadership roles within their Lions community will benefit from RLLI, where they will learn about club operations, opportunities and resources available to clubs, and gain both valuable leadership skills and a deeper understanding of how to better serve clubs.

Here is a sample of topics that will be presented during the Institute – by our very own multiple district leaders. It will be a full two days of learning!

- **Opening Session:** Meet your faculty and participants.
- Lions Fundamentals: Understand the association's history, principles, and structure while exploring the benefits of membership.
- Working In Teams: Review the characteristics of teams and how to develop effective teams.
- **Diversity:** Recognize the value of diversity and the benefits it can provide for clubs.
- Local Issues and Opportunities: Discuss topic-specific needs or interests of the participants.
- **Public Speaking:** Develop a framework for preparing speeches and guidelines for effective delivery.
- **Time Management:** Review the importance of time management, identify obstacles, and provide strategies for overcoming those obstacles.
- **Personal Mission Statement:** Develop a personal mission statement.
- **Member Motivation:** Examine personal needs and motivation.
- **Goal Setting:** Understand the value of establishing goals and develop a plan to achieve goals.
- Speech Preparation: Using the topic outline

created in the Public Speaking session, participants finalize their speeches.

• **Public Speaking Presentations:** Participants deliver their prepared speeches and receive feedback from the faculty.

Closing: Feedback and evaluation.

Fidelco Plans

Health Services of NH

I sit on the New England Advisory Board to Fidelco. At a recent meeting, I heard a few announcements I think are worth passing along which I will cover in this and a subsequent article.

Most notable to me are the changes being made to the Fidelco campus. During Covid, Fidelco transitioned many administrative jobs to remote work. This was so effective that most administrative offices at Fidelco are now being converted to "dog" areas. The dog trainers have more room for the daily activities with dogs in formal training. There is more room for the puppy raisers and dogs when they have their training sessions. The stated goal is to eliminate as much stress as possible for the dogs in the training environment, allowing the dogs to learn more easily with fewer distractions.



All Grant Applications meeting the following guidelines will be reviewed at the next Lions Youth Services Meeting. Our meetings are held at 6:30 pm on the 2nd Thursday of every month at the Airport Diner in Manchester. If possible, we encourage all clubs to join us to present their request.

- 1) All requests submitted by the President of a Lions Club in the State of New Hampshire Districts 44N and/or 44H
- 2) The Maximum Grant is \$500. LYS will consider up to 2 requests per NH Lions Club per Lions year (July-June)
- Each application must be for a unique project. Applications for the same project within the same Lions Year will not be considered.
- 4) Each application should benefit more than one individual. Applications benefitting one person will not be considered.
- Grant Applications <u>MUST</u> be received by the last day of the month *prior* to the start of the project, otherwise the request may not be considered.

It is the intent of Lions Youth Services Grant Program to partner with the Lions Clubs of New Hampshire to serve the Youth of our state; not to replace your club's support.







Less is More, Even if it is Just a Little Bit Less!

I recently came across the quote from Anne-Marie Bonneau who said, "We don't need a handful of people doing zero waste perfectly. We need millions of people doing it imperfectly". And it got me to thinking about the benefits of reducing waste and doing with less. Making these changes can seem daunting and unpleasant, but as someone who has made many of them, I have been surprised by how easy and cost effective they are, not to mention satisfying. Did you know that if 10,000 people reduced their waste by 10-percent that would reduce ten times more waste than if 100 people actually managed to get their waste down to zero?

We can also think about the joys of living below our means. When we use less and buy less, we usually see that we are just fine, and we stop wanting as much, which in turn not only benefits the environment but also saves money and can reduce our financial stress. It is a good feeling to know you have money in your pocket and even enough to give some away to our favorite causes.

What are some small steps we can take?

- 1. Only buy items you really need and consider buying second hand/thrifting.
- 2. Rather than getting rid of things that have become worn or imperfect, consider repairing them or repurposing them.
- 3. Have one plant-based meal a week.
- 4. Find a store that offers refills of sustainably made cleaning and self-care products.
- 5. Find ways to reduce your reliance on plastic.
- 6. Find a store that sells in bulk and fill your own containers.
- 7. Consider switching to a credit card company that does not invest in fossil fuels or other industries that are harmful to the environment.
- 8. Host a Lions upcycling/recycle event.
- 9. Plant some native perennials or grow a tomato plant. 10. Shop local.

Hunger in New Hampshire is not just a rural or urban issue; it affects individuals and families across the state. According to the New Hampshire Food Bank, approximately 1 in 9 residents are food insecure.

Several factors contribute to hunger in New Hampshire:

- **4. Education and Awareness**: Raising awareness about hunger and its causes can mobilize community support and drive action.

Hunger in New Hampshire is a complex issue that requires a collaborative effort to address.

By supporting the New Hampshire Food Bank and local food pantries, advocating for policy change, and engaging in community initiatives, we can work towards a future where no Granite Stater goes hungry.


HENNIKER LIONS
