Every day, people recycle more products to help the environment or people in need. One item that does not appear on published recycling lists is used eyeglasses. New Hampshire Lions have taken a very positive role in increasing the recycling of used eyeglasses. This allows them to bring sight to many who have never enjoyed the gift of sight, which so many of us take for granted.

This emphasis on recycling used eyeglasses started with the efforts of two New Hampshire Seacoast Lions. In 2006 Jack Helie, of Exeter, spearheaded the effort to increase collection of used eyeglasses. He even drove his own vehicle to deliver the glasses to the Eyeglass Recycle Center, Roanoke, Virginia. He and Ted Davis of the Hampton Area Club then got together. Jack still spearheaded the collection of glasses, and Ted took on the role of sorting, inspecting, and shipping the packaged glasses to the Roanoke Center.

Both men have since passed, but the program continues to grow. This program growth is the result of the effort of each club in New Hampshire, placing the collection boxes in prominent town/city locations, making regular collections, and getting the glasses to Hampton. The Hampton Area Lions hold weekend sorting and packing sessions. However, the volume of glasses collected by all the clubs is very large and more than can be processed in these weekend sessions. To help solve this problem, some members have taken glasses home to be sorted and packed.

#### Deluxe Butterscotch Nut Bars

- 1 ½ cups Flour
- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup Brown sugar
- 1/4 tsp Salt
- 10 tbsp Butter, softened to room temperature
- 1 cup Terri Lynn Deluxe Mix Nuts—Premium roasted salted nut mix with Cashews, Almonds, Brazil nuts, Pecans, Hazelnuts, Macadamias and Pistachios
- 1 cup Butterscotch chips
- 2 tbsp Heavy Cream

#### Directions

- Mix flour, brown sugar, salt, and butter in a small bowl till crumbly.
- Press crumbs into the bottom of a greased 9"x13" pan.
- Bake at 350 for 10 minutes.
- Sprinkle Deluxe Mix Nuts over hot crust.
- Melt butterscotch chips and cream together in a glass bowl in the microwave, slowly in 30 second increments.
- Pour melted chips/cream mixture over the nuts.
- Bake for about 5-10 more minutes, or until bubbly. Allow to cool before cutting (and eating)!



**Zone 1** - <u>Sophie Cutler</u>: The clubs in Zone 1 held their second meeting on January 21 via Zoom, and the main focus was on Membership and Mentorship. Zone 1 joined forces with Zone 2 on February 1st, helping pack boxes for two Manchester schools, during a "Supplies for Success" event at the Bedford Presbyterian Church. Lions from Bedford, Manchester, Merrimack and Merrimack Lioness participated in the fun "shopping" service activity. Another combined **Zone 1 + 2** service activity will take place on Wednesday, April 23 at Fueled by Kids in Bedford. Lions will be packing bags with peanut butter and graham crackers, which will be given to

students in Manchester to help alleviate hunger during the weeklong Spring Vacation break. Upcoming **Zone 1** club events – Bedford is hosting its annual "Meet the Candidates" pancake breakfast on March 9. Hooksett is serving up a free Irish meal to the community on March 17, and they're "gearing up" for their 28th annual model train show, happening on April 27. Manchester will be beautifying the city by holding their annual park cleanup day on April 26. Pinardville is partnering with Goffstown on April 12 (rain date April 19) to host a community, Egg Hunt.

Zone 2 – <u>Rosemary Gagne</u>: Three visitations have occurred and we are fortunate to have strong clubs in Zone 3. Although currently down 3 members, 5 new potential members are in the zone's "pipeline", so will be reporting in the positive soon. Eye screenings were done by the majority of the Zone's clubs and good reporting to the ROAR and LCI was done. All clubs are making impressive impacts on their communities.

**Zone 3** - <u>Larry Robinson</u>: In MD44N Zone 3, Lions Clubs continue to make a positive impact through a variety of community service projects, though there are areas that need attention. Out of the six clubs in the zone, two have fallen behind on their service reporting, indicating a need to improve their administrative processes. Additionally, the overall membership in the Zone has decreased by four members, which highlights the importance of focusing on recruitment and retention strategies. Despite these challenges, the clubs remain committed to delivering great service and supporting their communities with innovative and impactful projects.

**Zone 4** - <u>Christine Greenwood Smart</u>: Zone 4 met on Jan 15, 2025 in person. The clubs in this zone voted to meet in person for better collaboration, fellowship and networking rather than via zoom. Monadnock, Chesterfield, and Keene are very active with the zone meetings. Out of the 5 clubs in the zone, two are not participating in the meetings. One club is close to dissolving. The ZC has meet with the club leadership to assist with partnering/collaboration with other

groups in the community. Two clubs have had no new members with one of them having a net zero (no new and no drops). Two clubs are past 3 months with service project reporting. LCIF Donations have been made by three clubs in the zone for a total of \$7,720.00. Membership and leadership continue to be the focus with each club. There are 5 members in Zone 4 out of 20 members attending the upcoming RLLI – Reginal Lions Leadership Institute. This is demonstrating the commitment of this zone to upcoming leadership. Additionally, there will be a new member stepping up from this zone to be the NEW Zone 4 chair for next Lion year.

Zone 5 – Sarah Keniston : Zone 5 clubs are striving to grow stronger and improve our service. All of our clubs have climbed the learning curve of the Lions portal and are reporting service hours. We have engaged in meaningful service and fundraising projects, from providing holiday meals and vision screenings to Christmas tree sales and bonfires. We have also come together as a Zone to help and learn from each other, with Lions from throughout the zone and district ready to serve at Franklin's upcoming recycling and repair event on 3/1. Our clubs are also working hard to recruit new members and are determined to erase the member losses we have encountered in the past few months: We are pursuing strategies from holding membership events to double-checking that we can read prospective members' emails accurately when they fill out a request for more information! And finally, we are all committed to leader training to foster growth in our club members.

#### Zone 6 – <u>Tom Zuttermeister</u>:

**Canaan Lions** have been doing blood drives, giving rides to individuals for appointments, food boxes for the holidays, name tags and trophies and continuing with the health closet.

**Enfield Mascoma Lions and Lioness** have conducted 30 service activities, including one signature event since November 1, 2024. They have served 2,498 people with the help of 221 volunteers who have collectively contributed 1,549 hours of service.

Additionally, they have raised a total of \$3,050.00 in donations. One notable event was the Annual Christmas Tree & Wreath Sale at Huse Park, which raised over \$13,000. This signature activity included two days of sales at the Shaker Museum during its holiday sale. A total of 27 volunteers worked over 980 hours, and all Christmas trees and wreaths were sold out by the end of the event. In February, the Enfield Mascoma Lions organized a free Spaghetti Dinner for 75 residents of the Enfield and Canaan Senior Centers, with deliveries made to Prospect Pines and Indian River Apartments.

Enfield Mascoma Lioness Lion Club Branch held annual Thanksgiving Pie Sale - sold 117 pies; held annual Frosty's Craft World - 18 crafters, plus lunch sale, bake sale, raffles, and children's activities (decorate cookies, make Christmas ornaments, and write letters to Santa), hosted New Year's Luncheon for senior citizens - 63 seniors enjoyed a delicious meal of baked ham, mashed potatoes, carrots, coleslaw, rolls, and individual pineapple upside down cakes, provided 12 handmade post-mastectomy "hug" pillows to patients at DHMC, and assembled and distributed Valentine's goodie bags to residents of senior housing in Canaan and Enfield.

The Hanover Lions Club has sponsored two food drives: One prior to Thanksgiving and another food drive December 19. We are collecting personal care items for the Listen Center next Saturday (the 22nd) at the Hanover CVS. Our Club collected parking fees at the Thompson Parking lot for 2 Dartmouth Football home games in November. We have contracted with the college each year FOREVER. We contacted the Norwich Lions after responding to a general request to pick up used glasses from a local family eye care practice in Vermont. The Norwich Club had backlogged recycling due to circumstances beyond their control and asked us to manage the eye care glasses as well as taking on several of the boxes of

glasses they had stored. Star Johnson, Norma and Byron Young, Don Derrick, and Bill Hammond spent an afternoon counting, packing and then shipped 2,108 glasses to the Lions Recycling facility. We typically collect around 1,300 glasses A YEAR. Our annual vision screening at the Crossroads Academy is February 26. John Bayliss, as the Health Closet coordinator, continues to pick up, rehab and distribute medical equipment to Upper Valley residents and beyond.

The Lebanon Upper Valley Club has provided snacks for the first responders who use DHMC emergency room. We started in October of last year and fund the program on a quarterly basis. The club purchases supplies for David's House (home away from home for parents of sick children being treated at DHMC). Examples included paper towels and nail clippers. We also help Waypoint by purchasing items such as shampoo and hand lotion for families in need. The club has helped over 10 people with the purchase of eyeglasses and hearing aids and the club has been recognized for driving in the Lion Lift program.

**New London Lions** have recycled over 800 pairs of glasses and assisted one client with an eye exam and glasses. The club inducted a new member and made a donation to LCIF honoring the new member. The club is in active negotiation to participate in a joint marketing campaign with Masons, American Legion, and Odd Fellows to promote the work service organizations are doing in our region.

**Zone 7**: <u>Bonnie St Jean</u>: Kudos to Pemi Baker Lions for best Zone 7 meetings' participation, to Lisbon Lions and Whitefield Lions for new members, PCC Alan Ricard and PDG Henry McGee and their team for their ongoing commitment to charter the future Gorham Lions, and to Lancaster Lions for their commitment to re-engage Lions Service in their community. Focus fourth quarter will be portal training and reporting.

HUNGER

Dear Lions, Lioness Lions, and Leos,

Hunger in New Hampshire schools is a significant issue, with many students facing food insecurity.

Organizations like New Hampshire Hunger Solutions are working to address this problem by advocating for better access to nutritious food and increasing

participation in school meal programs. They focus on policy advocacy, public awareness, and coalition building to ensure that all students have access to the food they need.

Efforts are being made to improve participation in school breakfast programs, as New Hampshire ranks 47th in school breakfast participation. Why is school breakfast important? Kids who miss breakfast can't focus to learn, miss more school, are sick more often – and are hungry. There is lots of evidence to support that when a child eats a school breakfast, they will have better attendance, improved test scores, more stable moods, and can focus more in the classroom.

"Breakfast after the Bell" is an initiative aimed at increasing school breakfast participation by making it more accessible to students. Traditional breakfast programs often serve meals before the school day starts, which can be challenging for students who arrive late or have other morning commitments. "Breakfast after the Bell" addresses this by offering breakfast during or after the first class period, ensuring that more students have the opportunity to eat a nutritious meal to start their day.

In New Hampshire, schools have implemented various models of "Breakfast after the Bell," including:

**Grab & Go Breakfast** – Students can pick up a pre-packaged breakfast from kiosks or carts located in high-traffic areas like hallways or entrances.

**Breakfast in the Classroom** – Breakfast is delivered to classrooms, allowing students to eat while teachers take attendance or during the first few minutes of class.

**Second Chance Breakfast** – Students who missed breakfast before school can get a meal during a mid-morning break or between classes.

These models help reduce stigma associated with school breakfast programs and ensure that more students start their day with the nutrition they need to focus and learn effectively. Schools that have adopted "Breakfast after the Bell" have seen increased participation rates and improved student performance and behavior. These findings highlight the positive impact of "Breakfast after the Bell" on students' lives and underscore the importance of expanding such programs to reach more children in need. *[Source: New Hampshire Hunger Solutions]*




