Message from Nancy Charbono-Ricard, Second Vice District Governor

Dear Lions, Lioness Lions, and Leos,

May is Mental Health Awareness Month. All around the world, mental health and well-being is a growing need affecting our communities. Mental health is made up of a variety of factors, including our emotional, physical, psychological, and social well-being.

Since 2020, rates of anxiety and depression have increased by 25%.

1 in 7 youths aged 10-19 experience mental health conditions, though many are unrecognized and untreated.

14% of adults aged 60+ live with a mental health disorder. Loneliness and social isolation are key risk factors.

Stigma and discrimination remain against those with mental health conditions.

We can provide meaningful opportunities to get involved in serving this important Lions global initiative. Do you know that volunteering can alleviate symptoms of depression and anxiety, enhancing overall mood and emotional well-being? Here are a few service project volunteering ideas.

- 1. Donate food, toiletries, or maintenance services to a local transitional living home serving disabled individuals and/or those living with various mental health conditions in your community.
- 2. Volunteer at your local center for elderly care to assist with enrichment and well-being events.
- 3. Support mental health agencies and treatment centers by hosting fundraisers, providing publicity on social media, and collecting needed supplies.
- 4. Host a walk or event in partnership with a local mental health organization to raise mental health and well-being awareness.
- 5. Explore ways to increase access to vital mental health screening services in your community. *Sources: Lions Clubs International, World Health Organization*





LIONS DISTRICT 44N ZONE REPORTS (MAY 1, 2025)

Our Zones and Zone Chairs continue to achieve district goals having exceeded district training goals and anticipated to achieve 100% goal shortly. Zones are conducting Zone meetings and submitting visitation reports reporting excellent community service throughout the district. Congratulations to clubs in a great position to achieve club excellence banner patch for 2024-25 with a minimum of being two plus members or 10% increase. At this point in the year, six clubs are on schedule to achieve the banner patch based on the March 30, 2025 Club Assessment Report. This requirement is the hardest to achieve. See Club Excellence Banner Patch criteria for other requirements.

Zone 1 - Sophie Cutler (Bedford, Goffstown, Hooksett, Manchester, and Pinardville): The clubs in Zone 1 held their third meeting on April 17 in Manchester, and the main focus was on Leadership - GLT Tom Reynolds led the discussion.

Goffstown is staying busy with roadside cleanup as well as keeping up and maintaining Lions Field. They honored 4 outstanding high schoolers with scholarships this year, and will be holding a grand opening of their Popcorn Stand on Mother's Day, handing out free popcorn to moms all day.

Canaan Lions has hosted a Blood drive, first grade readers, loaned out medical equipment, recruited several new members, held an orientation for all members and made a donation to a fire victim. The Lebanon Upper Valley club continues to support Eyeglass requests; Waypoint and David's House with requested supplies; EMT Snack Bar at DHMC with \$750 dollars for the quarter, funded Middle School Student Music School Request, and took an ad in the Lions Soccer Program. - 1 ½ lb Boneless Chicken Breasts (cut into ¾-inch pieces)
- ¼ cup Brown sugar
- Black Pepper (just a pinch)
- 2 tbsp Chopped Garlic
- 1 tbsp Grated Ginger
- 1 cup Sliced Scallions
- 8 oz Sliced Water Chestnuts
- ¼ cup Terri Lynn Giant Cashews
- A small head of Boston or Bibb lettuce (leaves separated).

The NH Lions Green Team: The Year in Review and a Look Ahead

Every day, more Lions and community members are stepping up to protect our planet. This is encouraging news—because without meaningful action and a willingness to change our habits, global warming will continue at an alarming pace, our landfills and oceans will overflow with waste, natural disasters will increase, and life on Earth will become more difficult for future generations. Fortunately, the work of the Green Team and Lions Clubs across New Hampshire shows that hope and meaningful action are alive and well.

Last year, the NH Lions Green Team helped lead six impactful service projects: a DIY Sustainable Gift Fair, a shoe drive, two clothing upcycling and repair events, a WindowDressers build, and the launch of a Zero Waste initiative for Lions Clubs in New Hampshire. Lions Clubs throughout New Hampshire also contributed to environmental efforts in powerful ways. Over twenty clubs participated in Trex plastic film recycling, while others hosted sustainable crafting workshops, e-recycling events, shoe drives, tree-planting initiatives, grew food-pantry vegetable gardens, educated children on waste, and completed countless roadside cleanups, just to name a few of their achievements.

One thing we've learned is that many people don't realize the Lions have an environmental mission—but once they find out, they want to get involved. And once they get involved, they often want to become Lions!

Looking Ahead

The Green Team has exciting plans for the year ahead. We're currently preparing for a service project at the **New England Lions Council meeting on May 16**. 

She says to look at the various villages that currently exist in the town and add housing there. 
