

Greetings Lions of District 44N

Are the gears of Service, Membership, and Leadership turning? Now is the time to implement those strategies that allow your clubs to serve more and

grow in the process. It's time for this year's District 44N cabinet to engage with the clubs and offer resources, support, and ideas to support this effort. Visitations have started; we are visiting to hear your experiences so far this year, how the district might be able to help, and exchange best practices in service, membership, and leadership to make all clubs successful this year.

Perhaps a good way to work out some new strategies for growth would be in the district's goal for each club to achieve at least one new service activity involving an outside service organization, or at least 5 non-Lions dedicated to the service. The reason for this goal is two-fold. First, there are smaller clubs looking to passionately continue service but limited in resources. Bringing in others who have the same passion about your service activity would be an excellent way to complete the service. As a side note, please also keep in mind that additional resources are likely available at the zone and district level as well as with district or multiple district committees; such as Lions Youth Services or the 44N Environmental Committee. Whatever it takes to generate the critical mass that will allow your club to serve can be done!

Second, this will allow your club to start a conversation with those volunteers outside of Lions to discuss our organization in more detail. Invite them to learn more and see where it goes. This way, it's so much easier to just ask. You already have passion for service in common. We want to measure the results of this strategy and look at better ways to develop it for growth.

We are all excited to visit your clubs, share ideas, and collaborate for our future success. We will be watching the critical metrics related to Mission 1.5 and will keep you posted on its progress throughout

the year. We'll stay on what works and work together for needed improvements.

Our trips continued with visits to District 24 C Virginia and District 5 SW South Dakota. What amazing Lions in these areas, creating new and interesting ways of serving their community.

In Virginia we were able to visit the Virginia Eyeglass Recycling Center with Director Lion Kay Patrick. This location is where the Lions of NH sends their used eyeglasses. What an amazing location run by such a dedicated Lion. There is nearly nothing that they throw away. If a pair of glasses do not meet their requirements, they send them on their way to a scrap company and receive funds to help run the Center. They recycled close to 250,000 glasses last year with just over 52,000 being delivered overseas. About 25% to 35% of the glasses received are considered reusable.

Director Kay commented that the Lions of NH send them nearly 50% of the glasses they receive and that

the Hampton Lions do a fantastic job of sorting and packaging what they send. She couldn't say enough great things about those Lions. LeeAnn and I were both so proud to be able to say we were NH Lions.

We continue to look forward to serving the Lions of the World as we all work toward "Making Our Mark".

- 3. **Leadership Development**: Clubs must promote leadership opportunities by encouraging members to attend training and take on leadership roles within the organization.
- 4. **Club Operations**: A well-managed club demonstrates excellence in communication, financial responsibility, and member engagement, ensuring meetings are productive and enjoyable.
- 5. Lions International Clubs Foundation

 Donations: Clubs must donate a minimum of \$10 per member.
- 6. **Marketing**: The club must promote their service activities through local and/or social media.

New this year, is the **5 Star Excellence Award!** The club must achieve the Club Excellence Award along with a membership increase of 20% (minimum of 5 members per small club), minimum donations of \$20 per member or \$1000 (whichever is least) and annual submitted service and membership reports.

World Diabetes Day

World Diabetes Day is observed annually on November 14th to raise global awareness about diabetes, its prevention, and its impact on millions of people worldwide. Established in 1991 by the International Diabetes Federation and the World Health Organization, it marks the birthday of Sir Frederick Banting, who co-discovered insulin in 1922 -- a breakthrough in diabetes treatment.

Diabetes is a chronic condition that affects how the body processes blood sugar (glucose). There are two main types: Type 1 diabetes, an autoimmune condition, and Type 2 diabetes, which is often linked to lifestyle factors. Both can lead to severe complications, including heart disease, kidney failure, and vision loss if not managed properly.

The theme for World Diabetes Day often focuses on critical aspects of diabetes care. Recent campaigns have emphasized topics like access to diabetes care, ensuring that those affected can receive essential treatment, and promoting healthy lifestyles to prevent Type 2 diabetes.

Some activities that Lions can do during World Diabetes Day include:

- Community Screenings: organize free diabetes screenings in communities, providing early detection and risk assessment to help prevent the disease or manage it effectively.
- Educational Campaigns: host seminars, workshops, and awareness campaigns to educate the public on diabetes risk factors, the importance of a healthy lifestyle, and how to manage the disease.
- Fundraising for Diabetes Research and Care: raise funds for diabetes research, support local clinics, and provide essential resources like insulin and blood sugar testing kits to underserved communities.
- Partnership with Health Organizations: collaborate with hospitals, health agencies, and governments to ensure better access to diabetes care and support.

Lions Clubs International Foundation offers districts a matching diabetes grant ranging from \$10,000 up to \$150,000. The Foundation also offers district grants for our other global causes. How can we take advantage of these grants? By following the example of Zone Chair Sarah Keniston and forming committees for our global causes, creating mission statements and establishing plans and initiatives. Once that is done, those committees can approach District leadership to apply for grants that would allow them to impact more people and create projects on a larger scale. District 44N has always responded to the call to fund LCIF. Now let us take the opportunity to have LCIF answer our call!


