LIONS INTERNATIONAL LEO SERVICE GRANT EMPOWERS YOUTH TO LEAD COMMUNITY CHANGE

In a world where young people are often at the forefront of social change, the Lions International Leo Service Grant is giving them the tools to turn their vision into action. This initiative provides funding to Leo clubs around the globe to tackle pressing local and global challenges through innovative service projects.

The grant offers up to \$5,000 per project, enabling Leos to carry out large-scale efforts that would otherwise be limited by financial constraints. From environmental restoration to disaster relief, the program encourages young leaders to make a tangible difference in their communities.

To be eligible, Leo clubs must be officially chartered and in good standing with Lions Clubs International. Projects must align with the Lions' global causes, which include vision, hunger, the environment, childhood cancer, diabetes, and humanitarian relief. Each proposal must be detailed, outlining objectives, beneficiaries, timelines, and budgets, and must be submitted through the club's sponsoring Lions organization.

The grant is also strengthening the bond between Lions and Leos. By collaborating on service initiatives, Lions lend their experience while Leos bring fresh ideas and enthusiasm to the table. This partnership is key to ensuring the success of grant-funded projects.

Leo clubs interested in applying for the grant are encouraged to begin by identifying a service need in their community and developing a creative solution. Applications, submitted through the sponsoring Lions club, are reviewed on a rolling basis.

All Grant Applications meeting the following guidelines will be reviewed at the next Lions Youth Services Meeting. Our meetings are held at 6:30 pm on the 2nd Thursday of every month at the Airport Diner in Manchester. If possible, we encourage all clubs to join us to present their request.

- All requests submitted by the President of a Lions Club in the State of New Hampshire Districts 44N and/or 44H
- 2) The Maximum Grant is \$500. LYS will consider up to 2 requests per NH Lions Club per Lions year (July-June)
- Each application must be for a unique project. Applications for the same project within the same Lions Year will not be considered.
- Each application should benefit more than one individual. Applications benefitting one person will not be considered.
- Grant Applications <u>MUST</u> be received by the last day of the month *prior* to the start of the project, otherwise the request may not be considered.

It is the intent of Lions Youth Services Grant Program to partner with the Lions Clubs of New Hampshire to serve the Youth of our state; not to replace your club's support.

From the very first grant awarded in 1972 to aid flood victims in Rapid City, South Dakota, to the recent \$200,000 Major Catastrophe Grant supporting earthquake relief in Turkey and Syria, LCIF empowers Lions to make a tangible difference.

Disasters strike without warning, leaving families displaced, homes destroyed, and communities forever changed. The United Nations estimates that annual economic losses that they have previously recorded have been "chronically underestimating and undermeasuring the impact of disasters." The actual true cost is closer to \$2.3 trillion. Yet, with LCIF's support, Lions have consistently risen to the challenge, providing immediate relief like food, water, and shelter, as well as long-term reconstruction to rebuild lives. From July 2024 to January 2025 alone, LCIF awarded 89 disaster relief grants totaling \$1,742,295 to empower Lions' efforts worldwide. In my role, I will work closely with our district and multiple district leaders to ensure that the Lions of New Hampshire are equipped to respond swiftly and effectively. Whether it's securing emergency grants

for immediate aid or advocating for Major Catastrophe Grants for large-scale recovery, I am committed to ensuring our clubs have the resources they need to serve. I will also collaborate with the District's Global Service Team Leader and other chairpersons to align our efforts, ensuring we maximize our impact.

To enhance community collaboration and support, I am forming a team with the district leadership to coordinate and bolster community resources and partnerships. This team will train Lions to respond safely to local or state disasters, whether natural or human-caused, to assist those in need. Utilizing the Incident Command System (ICS) framework, the team will streamline our disaster response efforts. This initiative is still in its early stages, with further details to be shared as plans develop. The team will be called Granite State Preparedness, Response, and International Disaster Empowerment, or GS-PRIDE Team for short.

But this mission cannot succeed without you, our dedicated Lions and Leos. Your generosity and dedication fuels LCIF's disaster response and relief efforts, enabling us to provide essentials like meals, blankets, and hygiene kits to those who have lost everything. I encourage every club to engage in fundraising, report your service projects on the Lions Portal, and share your stories of impact to inspire others. Together, we can ensure that Lions remain a beacon of hope, wherever and whenever disaster strikes.

Let's unite in this new Lions year (2025-2026) to make a difference and show our passion to help those in need. Donate to LCIF at lionsclub.org, connect with your local clubs and leadership to plan disaster relief initiatives, and let us show the world that where there is a need, there's a **Lion and the GS-PRIDE Team**.

Producing a pound of beef can use up to 1,800 gallons of water, while lentils need around 200. And livestock farming is a major cause of habitat loss and biodiversity decline. Choosing plant-based meals helps conserve resources and protect ecosystems.

Plant-based meals are often healthier and cheaper. Staples like beans, rice, and veggies are affordable and full of nutrients.
