
use and perhaps simplify communications between members or groups within your clubs.


Global Causes: What Lions Around the World Work Towards

What Are Hunger Grants?

The Lions Clubs International Hunger Grant is a funding opportunity that empowers Lions Clubs to develop and execute projects that alleviate hunger within their communities. These grants are awarded to local Lions Clubs worldwide, enabling them to create meaningful, impactful programs that address the root causes of hunger.

Grant Details and Application Process

Hunger Grants can be used to fund a variety of hunger-relief initiatives, including but not limited to:

- Food distribution programs: Providing meals or food packages to individuals and families in need.
- Nutrition education: Offering cooking classes, nutrition workshops, or resources to help communities make healthier food choices.
- Community gardens or farms: Establishing sustainable food sources through urban farming or gardening programs.
- Partnerships with local food banks and shelters: Strengthening existing food distribution networks to reach more people.

To apply for a Hunger Grant, Lions Clubs must submit a detailed proposal outlining their project, the population they intend to serve, and how they plan to use the funds. The grants are typically awarded to clubs with projects that have the potential for long-term impact and can effectively address hunger and malnutrition.

Application Deadlines

Applications may be considered at the LCIF Board of Trustees meeting three times per year in August, January and May. The deadlines for applying are February 1, May 1 and October 1. It is recommended that applications be submitted well in advance of the application deadline.





The Carter Center and LCIF: A Powerful Partnership to Fight Disease and Restore Sight

Since 1994, LCIF and The Carter Center, founded by former U.S. President Jimmy Carter and First Lady Rosalynn Carter, have partnered in a remarkable collaboration to combat preventable blindness and neglected tropical diseases. Together, these organizations have made a profound global impact—especially in the fight against trachoma, the world's leading cause of preventable blindness.

Trachoma is an infectious eye disease that can lead to blindness if left untreated. It disproportionately affects people living in poverty, often in remote and underserved regions. Recognizing the devastating effects of this disease, LCIF and The Carter Center joined forces to eliminate trachoma through public health initiatives, medical interventions, and community-based education.

Through their partnership, LCIF has provided over US\$30 million in grant funding to support The Carter Center's efforts to eliminate trachoma in countries such as Ethiopia, Mali, Niger, South Sudan, and Sudan. These grants have helped train local health workers, distribute antibiotics, provide surgeries, and raise awareness about hygiene and sanitation.

LCIF has supported The Carter Center's mission to eliminate river blindness and trachoma in 14 African and Latin American countries. Their joint efforts have resulted in:

- Over 500 million treatments for river blindness.
- More than 210 million treatments for trachoma.

- 820,000 sight-saving surgeries for trichiasis (a severe form of trachoma).
- 3.3 million latrines built to improve sanitation and prevent disease.

Local Lions clubs play a crucial role in mobilizing communities. They coordinate with Carter Center staff to:

- Organize mass drug administration campaigns.
- Support sight-saving surgeries.
- Advocate for continued government attention to these diseases.
- Promote hygiene and sanitation efforts to prevent reinfection.

In February 2025, LCIF renewed its partnership with The Carter Center, committing \$2 million to continue their work in Ethiopia, South Sudan, Venezuela, and Brazil. This funding ensures that their shared mission to eliminate preventable blindness remains strong.

Through this enduring partnership, The Carter Center and LCIF continue to bring hope, health, and vision to millions across the globe. Their work is a testament to the power of collaboration in creating a brighter future for all.
